Got an outage?

Diverse Power's upgraded outage notification system has been going strong for a year.

Designed to keep members informed on power outages and restoration efforts, the online system features a map representing the 80-plus communities within our service territory. When storms or other sources interrupt power, the map is color-coded to reflect the severity of outages in each area. Members away from home either at work or travelling-can quickly access the website via computer or mobile device to determine if their neighborhood is affected. The interactive map is updated in real time, showing the progress electric crews are making in restoring power.

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Spring cleaning? We can help!

s the weather warms, the mood to A spring clean heats up, too. This year, don't stop at clearing out your carport. Take the time to do some spring cleaning on your energy use.

The average American home annually requires \$2,200 in energy to operate. The experts at personal finance company Wallet Hub offer these seven suggestions for reducing your monthly energy bill:

1. Get an energy audit. You'll have an easier time sealing an energy leak if you know where it is, and an auditor can show you. (Diverse Power offers an online self-audit at diversepower.com. Simply open our Energy Info tab, then visit our Home Energy Suite, where you'll find the Home Energy Calculator to complete your audit. Or, for \$50, we'll conduct an energy audit for you, including a study of your home's energy history and a thermal camera house evaluation. A premium audit, which costs \$350, adds an HVAC inspection, blower door and duct blaster examinations and entitles you to rebates when upgrades are made.)

2. Replace incandescent lightbulbseven if they're not burned out yetwith compact fluorescent lights, or CFLs. Incandescent lighting wastes more money in energy costs than you'll spend by replacing them. (We have CFLs for sale at our LaGrange office at 1400 S. Davis Road; stop by and take a look.)



3. To avoid energy-stealing drafts, caulk gaps around windows and add attic insulation.

4. Learn about the energy use of your appliances. The more you understand about energy, the less you'll

5. If building a new home, choose an architect or builder committed to green building and energy efficiency. Many green building strategies don't cost any more when they're incorporated during construction—like making energy-efficient choices for the direction the house faces and where windows are placed. 6. Replace outdated furnaces and air-conditioning systems with updated models designed to work more efficiently, waste less energy and save you money.

7. When you replace appliances, look at more than the price tag. Consider the operating costs; often, the savings on your energy bill will more than make up for the slightly higher price you pay for more efficient models.

This Month: New TV trends

Before you shop for your next big screen, check out these five TV trends:

- 1. Smart TVs. Manufacturers are getting support from content providers like Netflix and telecommunications companies that offer fiber optics to get Internet-based TV into more homes. Smart TVs let the viewer "watch" the Internet to view movies, TV shows, games and anything else they could view on a computer. Watch for more models to appear.
- **2. 4K.** These ultra-high definition TVs (UHDTV) have four times the resolution of a typical high-def television, providing a much sharper picture.
- **3. Curved TVs.** With a curved screen, these models give the impression of a deeper viewing area and offer a movie theater experience.
- **4. OLED displays.** Organic light-emitting diodes (OLED) serve as their own light source, so the TV needs no backlighting; the result is the thinnest TV on the market, superior color contrast and greater energy efficiency than most TVs.
- **5. Big and small screens.** While the typical man cave has a TV screen that barely fits the wall, many teens and young adults bypass the big-screen experience in favor of viewing TV programming on their smartphones and tablets.



Continuing our green energy efforts

Diverse Power Incorporated offers consumer-members the opportunity to supply their electric needs with cleaner, renewable energy from Georgia's natural resources by utilizing biomass as a green source of energy. This biomass consists of methane gases and wood waste that are burned in facilities that use the heat from the burning process to generate environmentally friendly electric energy.

In 2005, Diverse Power joined other Georgia electric cooperatives by signing on with Green Power EMC, the first renewable energy program in Georgia. A not-for-profit cooperative founded in 2001, Green Power EMC supports Georgia's electric cooperatives in their search for renewable resources by finding, screening, analyzing and negotiating power purchase agreements with Georgia-based renewable resource providers. Green Power EMC now provides environmentally friendly electricity through 18 member EMCs.

The environmentally friendly electricity offered by Diverse Power's green power program is Green-e Energy Certified by the Center for Resource Solutions (CRS).
